

Finding retailers to rent some of the space also has been a challenge in the tough economic time, but Jetchick said she wasn't too worried about that yet.

While The Gardens on Havana development means the future could be bright for businesses along the corridor, the present has been a struggle, Jetchick said, though not as bad as some sectors of the economy.

"Every time I sit here in the office, the business news is depressing," she said. "Then I go out and work with the businesses and the general consensus is we're holding our own."

Jetchick said many business owners along the corridor are saying the holiday season wasn't as disastrous as it was in other places.

She also said many businesses have accepted that the sagging economy is out of their control and they simply need to wait it out until things get better.
